This film gives us some of the heavyweights of Scottish culture and literature; Ali Smith, David Hayman and Ian Rankin among others pay homage to McIlvanney's influence. And William's brother, acclaimed sports writer Hugh McIlvanney, also makes an appearance as the two reminisce about their childhood growing up in Kilmarnock, where "being hard was important, but the importance of the word" was dominant.

At 77 William McIlvanney is still effortlessly cool, sporting the iconic good looks of Clark Gable. This is a powerful, funny and intimate portrayal of the writer as he looks back at his life, and the surprise of his 'rebirth' after his work went out of print, as his work is rediscovered once more by a new generation.

#### William McIlvanney Biography

William McIlvanney was born in the town of Kilmarnock, the son of a miner. His first book, Remedy is None, was published in 1966 and won the Geoffrey Faber Memorial Prize. Docherty (1975), a moving portrait of a miner whose courage and endurance is tested during the depression, won the Whitbread Novel Award. His novels feature tough, often violent, men locked in a struggle with their own nature and background.

His novel, The Kiln (1996), is the story of Tam Docherty, the grandson of the hero of Docherty. It won the Saltire Society Scottish Book of the Year Award. Laidlaw (1977), The Papers of Tony Veitch (1983) and Strange Loyalties (1991) are crime novels featuring Inspector Jack Laidlaw. Laidlaw is considered to be the first book of Tartan Noir.

William McIlvanney is also an acclaimed poet, and is the author of The Longships in Harbour: Poems (1970) and Surviving the Shipwreck (1991). After a period when his work was unavailable, William McIlvanney's work has been republished by Canongate, starting with Laidlaw, The Papers of Tony Veitch and Strange Loyalties in 2013.

#### Director Biography – Maurice O'Brien

Maurice is a documentary filmmaker whose work includes the films 'Northern Soul: Keeping the Faith' and 'Tom Wood: What do Artists do All Day?', as well as numerous films for the BBC's Culture Show. His award-winning short 'Buffalo Dreams' (produced with the Scottish Documentary Institute) has screened at festivals all over the world. Originally from Ireland he has been mainly based in Glasgow for the last seven years.

#### Producer Biography - Gill Parry

Gill Parry is a documentary producer, who loves making films and telling true stories with real people. She's been lucky enough to work with some amazing, talented and extraordinary human beings over the years, and has helped make a few films happen. She has loved (almost) every minute of it.
